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George Gelauff is deputy director at the Directorate for Economic Policy of the Ministry of Economic Affairs. His main responsibilities at the Ministry are strategy and research. For a part of his time he is professor at the University of Nijmegen, teaching about the knowledge economy and the economics of education and innovation. Previously he was affiliated with CPB Netherlands' Bureau for Economic Policy Analysis, lastly as head of department.
